

## ENG 131: Poetry in America: The City

### Overview

Drawing from the acclaimed *Poetry in America* PBS series, **Poetry in America: The City from Whitman to Hip Hop** considers those American poets whose themes, forms, and voices have given expression to visions of the city since 1850. Featuring a combination of video tutorials and conversations, archival images and texts, expeditions to historic literary sites, sample classroom visits, and practical exercises designed to engage learners and support skills development, this course introduces content and techniques intended to help students learn how to read texts of increasing complexity.

## What You'll Learn

Beginning with Walt Whitman, the great poet of 19th-century New York, we explore the diverse and ever-changing environment of the modern city-from Chicago to London, from San Francisco to Detroit-through the eyes of such poets as Carl Sandburg, Emma Lazarus, Edna St. Vincent Millay, Langston Hughes, Marianne Moore, Frank O'Hara, Gwendolyn Brooks, Allen Ginsberg, Robert Hayden, and Robert Pinsky, as well as contemporary hip hop and spoken word artists.

## How to Succeed

To be successful in this course, we recommend English language fluency and computer literacy. We also encourage you to make sure your laptop or desktop computer meets the <u>technical</u> <u>requirements</u>.

#### **Time Commitment**
